I like a holiday with a purpose. I need to see something particular, or go trekking. If I just sit on a beach, my hair goes frizzy! The first thing I do when I'm in a new place is find the market. They give you a great opportunity to be involved in the life of a place. I also never travel without a thick, boring book that I know I'll never finish as I have a phobia of running out of reading material and being stuck with only in-flight magazines to read.

C

I never travel without my Archos, which is a kind of MP3 player, which stores music, video, film. It also has a recording function so I can record ideas when I'm on the road and take down people's phone numbers as I'm always losing my mobile phone. Coming back home I always bring back bows and arrows, and poison darts. I only bring back things that are personal. I've got a special room where I display my collection on the shelves and walls. Each of them has a story.

B

I always take an extremely large pile of books. It will be really exciting when someone does for reading what the iPod did for music so I can take some kind of digital book. That would make my life so much easier. It's great going to look at ancient sites and castles, but it's the people who make the experience wonderful. I know that sounds strange but I never buy souvenirs. I always bring back experiences. I believe what I experience is 10 times more than any object I can bring back with me.

D

I first started travelling with a music group when I was about 17. We were just a gang of crazed youngsters going around the world. I think I was too young and a bit stupid. I remember the first time I went to France I couldn't believe they had their own newspapers. It seemed ridiculous to me that they wanted to read about any news other than ours! Coming back home I always bring back odd fun stuff, such as paper hats. My house is littered with all sorts of things, but I don't collect anything specific, I just pick up whatever crosses my path.

The Voice of America went on the air on February 24, 1942. The first broadcast was beamed to Europe via BBC transmitters. From that moment, America had found its ‘voice’ abroad. The first VOA broadcasts were produced in rented studios in New York. John Houseman, the first VOA director, later recalled those first broadcasts: ‘We went on the air... with no name, out of a cramped studio, on borrowed transmitters, with absolutely no direction from anyone as to what we should broadcast other than the truth.’

The VOA broadcasts latest news and information to an international audience. Today using radio, television, and the Internet, the Voice of America reaches an audience of more than 134 million people each week. It broadcasts news, information and educational programming every week. Programs are produced in 45 languages. Programs include news, features and education in documentary, discussion, and call-in formats, both live and pre-recorded.

All staff who report, manage, edit, and prepare programming at the VOA in both central and language services, therefore, subscribe to three principles: sourcing, accuracy and fairness. VOA news and programming must be strictly sourced and verified. The VOA normally requires a minimum of two independent sources before any newswriter, background writer, political affairs writer or correspondent may broadcast information as fact in any language. The VOA is required to present a full and fair account of events and serves as a consistently reliable and authoritative source of news.

The VOA has a growing worldwide network of more than 1,200 local affiliate stations, which include FM and medium wave (MW or AM) radio stations, television stations and networks, and cable systems. The VOA has the largest integrated digital audio system in the world, 27 radio broadcast studios, 33 production and recording studios, 30 professional audio mixing and dubbing stations, 4 television studios, 21 video editing suites, and studios for master control, recording, scheduling, and feed intake.

On October 19, 1959, the Voice of America broadcast the first Special English program. It was an experiment. The goal was to communicate by radio in clear and simple English with people whose native language was not English. Special English programs quickly became some of the most popular on the VOA. They still are. Special English writers read at a slower pace, about two-thirds the speed of standard English and use short, simple sentences that contain only one idea. They use active voice and do not use idioms. It helps people learn more about American life and stay informed about world news and developments in science.

The VOA has a web page/site, which is well-known all over the world. There are quizzes, word games, word puzzles, proverbs, slang expressions, anagrams, a random-sentence generator and other computer assisted language learning activities. Quiz yourself on English grammar and vocabulary while reading scripts of the Special English programs from the VOA. Not only can you practice English, but you can learn many interesting things while doing so. Even though the primary focus is for ESL, native English speakers may also find some interesting things on this site.
